What does it mean to be generous?

"He dressed himself "all in his best," and at last got out into the streets. To be generous is to give your time, your attention, your very being.

But how can you do this, right now? In Charlotte?

Our goal today is to explore how you might approach the world in the spirit of generosity to <u>accompany the poor</u> in an journey toward wholeness.

"To accompany someone is to go somewhere with him or her, to break bread together, to be present on a journey with a beginning and an end. There's an element of mystery, of openness, of trust, in accompaniment. The companion, the accompagnateur, says: "I'll go with you and support you on your journey wherever it leads. **I'll share your fate for a while**"—and by "a while," I don't mean a little while. Accompaniment is about sticking with a task until it's deemed **completed**—not by the accompagnateur, but by the person being accompanied"

To Accompany is to **Engage**




The Mission, 1986

Engage

- Centered in authentic human relationships
- Breaks barriers that divide communities by race, class, gender, and zip code
- Is not transactional, but seeks shared understanding
- Is long term
- Builds relationships and friendships that go beyond the "work" at hand
- Requires empathy and interpersonal skills

Assess

- Uses qualitative and quantitative data to understand the nature of the social problem at hand
- Requires diverse voices and sources at the table
- Is a collective process when assessing at the community level

Intervene

- Mutually defined goals, where the "accompagnateur" plays a critical role in choosing how to move forward
- Evidence based, but incorporates lived experience
- Emphasizes "together" over "us" and "them"
